

Population

Total, County 179,319

Total, service area population: 179,319.

Notes

- For service areas comprised of multiple counties or ZIP codes, population estimates are computed using weighted averages that account for the relative population sizes of each area, rather than unweighted (simple) averages.
- Individuals of Hispanic/Latino origin belonging to any racial group are classified as Hispanic/Latino; all individually reported races include only populations of that race, e.g., White includes all White populations only with no Hispanic/Latino origin.
- The percentage of the population living in poverty is defined as those with family incomes below 100% of the federal poverty threshold—an annual income of \$30,000 for a family of four in 2023.
- Educational attainment reflects adults over the age of 25.
- Median individual earnings represents earnings of the population over 16 years in the past 12 months at the time of survey; earnings are in 2023 inflation adjusted dollars.
- The living wage is equal to \$43,000, corrected for the service area's cost of living. An earnings level of \$43,000 is estimated to be the level needed to support an individual.
- · Census estimates for some counties and some race/ethnicities are not available and cannot be reported.



Student Success: Retention and Completion

Completion rates are important indicators of student success, correlating with post-graduation success in transfer, employment, and ability to repay loans. First-to-second-year retention (the rate of re-enrollment among students who were at your college the first year) provides an early indicator of a student's likelihood to complete as well as sense of belonging, perceived value of the curriculum, and strength of the college's student supports and services.



Notes

- The retention cohort includes first-time students who started in either the fall or the spring of an academic year.
- Retention = reenrollment in, or graduation from the beginning institution at any point in the second academic year.
- 150% graduation rate includes first-time students entering the college any semester and completing a credential within three years of first enrollment.
- The Aspen Prize Benchmark is the average of the 10 finalist institutions for the 2025 Aspen Prize: 2018-19 to 2020-21 cohorts for retention; 2015-16 to 2017-18 cohorts for full-time + part-time completion; fall 2017 to fall 2019 cohorts for first-time, full-time student graduation + transfer rate.
